AGREEMENT NO. 17-007-ITB-LW AMENDMENT NUMBER 9

This Amendment Number 9 is made on June 4, 2020 by the County and amends the original Agreement Number 17-007-ITB-LW ("Main Agreement") dated March 30, 2017, between LT Services Inc. ("Contractor") and the County Board of Arlington County, Virginia ("County").

The County and the Contractor agree to amend the main contract called for under the Main Agreement by hereby adding additional cleaning services specifically related to COVID-19 to include the following Scope of Work for two locations only, for a period of <u>June 4, 2020 through June 30, 2020</u>, at which time the locations below and services rendered in the Scope of Work following in this Amendment Number 7 shall end unless continued by a written Amendment and executed by the parties:

Highlander Motor Inn 3336 Wilson Blvd Arlington, VA 22201

Day's Inn Columbia Pike 3030 Columbia Pike Arlington, VA 22204

*County staff reserve the right to add home locations for COVID-19 related cleaning as an on-call service request. If LT Services is not able to meet the time frame requested the County may request such services of other providers. LT Services shall be the first provider contacted for the on-call time sensitive services. County staff shall document the request for acceptance or denial of the specific work.

Notification Process:

- 1. The contractor will be contacted by DHS Facilities Operation Bureau (FOB) staff when a room has been vacated and needs to be cleaned and sanitized. FOB will coordinate with the contractor to schedule the cleaning time. Rooms must be cleaned within 48 hours of request.
- 2. When the contractor arrives on site, they must check in with the County's Client Service Unit staff located at the site. Upon completion of the cleaning, the cleaning crew must check out with County staff.

Cleaning Guidelines

Upon FOB request, refuse and other items left in hotel rooms must be removed prior to sanitization. Rooms must be sanitized according to the CDC Cleaning Guidelines dated April 1, 2020, as attached. This includes cleaning and disinfecting the room, bathroom, and all surfaces therein. Cleaners must always wear Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), including gowns, gloves and face masks.

Hard Surfaces

Wear disposable gloves, which should be discarded after each cleaning. Use a product that is EPA-approved for use against SARS-COV2, the virus that causes COVID-19. A list of products can be found on the CDC.gov/coronavirus web site. Follow manufacturer's instructions for concentration, application method and contact times.

- Alternatively, use a bleach solution at a dilution rate of 5 tablespoons per gallon of water.
- Wipe clean all touch points and restrooms.

Soft Surfaces

For all carpets, rugs and drapes, remove visible contamination and clean with appropriate cleaners. Use an electrostatic fogging machine for disinfecting surfaces, draperies, carpet and rugs with a product that is EPA-approved for use against SARS-COV2, the virus that causes COVID-19. A list of products can be found on the CDC.gov/coronavirus web site. Follow manufacturer's instructions for concentration, application method and contact times.

All supplies and PPE must be furnished by the contractor.

Staffing and Cost

The Cost of this Amendment is for a Not to Exceed amount of \$233,498.00

The contractor will charge a flat rate of \$60 per room for refuse removal prior to sanitization upon FOB request.

Each room will take 1.5-3 hours to sanitize, depending on the condition. The cost to sanitize each room is as follows:

Staff

- Cleaner: \$35 per hour, or \$52.50 \$105.00 per room (total hours required per room dependent upon the condition of the room)
- Supervisor: \$45 per hour, or \$11.25 \$22.50 per room (total hours required per room dependent upon the condition of the room)

Supplies and Equipment

- Electrostatic Fogging Machine: \$75 per hour, or \$112.50 \$225 per room (total hours required per room dependent upon the condition of the room)
- Vital Oxyde: \$58.37 per gallon
- PPE: \$25 per person, or \$50 per site visit (1 Cleaner + 1 Supervisor)

Total Sanitization Cost per Room: \$176.25 - \$352.50 per room (depending on the condition of the room) plus cost of actual Vital Oxyde used plus \$50 for PPE per site visit.

Time sheets must be submitted with each invoice reflecting Cleaner and Supervisor time spent sanitizing hotel rooms and other spaces. Each time sheet must include date, property name, room number or name, staff name and time spent sanitizing reported in quarter hour increments. Time sheets must be signed by employee and attested for accuracy by the appropriate supervisory representative.

INCORPORATION OF FEDERAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY (FEMA) TERMS

This Contract is subject to certain provisions required by Appendix II to the Uniform Rules (Contract Provisions for non-Federal Entity Contracts Under Federal Awards) as required by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) found at 2 C.F.R. §§ 200.317 – 200.326 (Exhibit 1). All FEMA-mandated terms control in the event of a conflict with any other provisions of this Agreement. The Contractor must

not perform any act, fail to perform any act or refuse to comply with any County requests if doing so would cause the County to violate the FEMA terms and conditions.

The Contractor must include this clause without modification in each subcontract that is financed in whole or in part by the FEMA Public Assistance Program (See Exhibit 1, FEMA Clauses)

All other terms and conditions of the Main Agreement remain in effect.

EXHIBIT 1

FEMA Clauses

Required Contract Clauses for Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Public Assistance Funding

This project or work may be funded in whole or in part by grants from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). The award of any contract is subject to the requirements of 2 C.F.R. §§ 200.317 – 200.326 and 2. C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II requiring compliance with purchasing procedures and standards.

Contractor is responsible for ensuring its compliance with all applicable FEMA requirements. Additionally, Contractor is responsible for ensuring that subcontractors, at as many tiers of the Project as required, perform in accordance with the terms, conditions and specifications of the contract, including all applicable FEMA requirements.

Upon request of the County or FEMA, Contractor shall provide evidence of the steps it has taken to ensure its compliance with the FEMA requirements, as well as evidence of the steps it has taken to ensure subcontractor performance, and/or submit evidence of subcontractor's compliance at all tiers.

The following required contract clauses will be incorporated by reference in any contract awarded by the County. These provisions and required contract clauses are in addition to other General Contract Terms, Specifications, Special and Technical Specifications. Some provisions and clauses require the Contractor to execute and submit certain required certifications, which are included herein. Failure to execute and submit required certifications may render a contract null and void.

DISPUTE RESOLUTION

All disputes arising under this Agreement or concerning its interpretation, whether involving law or fact and including but not limited to claims for additional work, compensation or time, and all claims for alleged breach of contract must be submitted in writing to the Project Officer as soon as the basis for the claim arises. In accordance with the Arlington County Purchasing Resolution, claims denied by the Project Officer may be submitted to the County Manager in writing no later than 60 days after the final payment. The time limit for a final written decision by the County Manager is 30 days. Procedures concerning contractual claims, disputes, administrative appeals and protests are contained in the Arlington County Purchasing Resolution. The Contractor must continue to work as scheduled pending a decision of the Project Officer, County Manager, County Board or a court of law.

This provision applies to any contract greater than \$250,000.

TERMINATION

The County may terminate this Contract at any time as follows: (1) for cause, if, as determined by the County, the Contractor is in breach or default or has failed to perform the Work satisfactorily; or (2) for the convenience of the County.

Upon receipt of a notice of termination, the Contractor must not place any further orders or subcontracts

for materials, services or facilities; must terminate all vendors and subcontracts, except as are necessary for the completion of any portion of the Work that the County did not terminate; and must immediately deliver all documents related to the terminated Work to the County.

Any purchases that the Contractor makes after the notice of termination will be the sole responsibility of the Contractor, unless the County has approved the purchases in writing as necessary for completion of any portion of the Work that the County did not terminate.

If any court of competent jurisdiction finds a termination for cause by the County to be improper, then the termination will be deemed a termination for convenience.

A. TERMINATION FOR CAUSE, INCLUDING BREACH AND DEFAULT; CURE

1. <u>Termination for Unsatisfactory Performance</u>. If the County determines that the Contractor has failed to perform satisfactorily, then the County will give the Contractor written notice of such failure(s) and the opportunity to cure them within 15 days or any other period specified by the County ("Cure Period"). If the Contractor fails to cure within the Cure Period, the County may terminate the Contract for failure to provide satisfactory performance by providing written notice with a termination date. The Contractor must submit any request for termination costs, with all supporting documentation, to the County Project Officer within 30 days after the expiration of the Cure Period. The County may accept or reject the request for termination costs, in whole or in part, and may notify the Contractor of its decision within a reasonable time.

In the event of termination by the County for failure to perform satisfactorily, the Contractor must continue to provide its services as previously scheduled through the termination date, and the County must continue to pay all fees and charges incurred through the termination date.

2. <u>Termination for Breach or Default</u>. If the County terminates the Contract for default or breach of any Contract provision or condition, then the termination will be immediate after notice of termination to the Contractor (unless the County provides for an opportunity to cure), and the Contractor will not be permitted to seek termination costs.

Upon any termination pursuant to this section, the Contractor will be liable to the County for costs that the County must expend to complete the Work, including costs resulting from any related delays and from unsatisfactory or non-compliant work performed by the Contractor or its subcontractors. The County will deduct such costs from any amount due to the Contractor; or if the County does not owe the Contractor, the Contractor must promptly pay the costs within 15 days of a demand by the County. This section does not limit the County's recovery of any other damages to which it is entitled by law.

Except as otherwise directed by the County, the Contractor must stop work on the date of receipt the notice of the termination.

B. TERMINATION FOR THE CONVENIENCE OF THE COUNTY

The County may terminate this Contract in whole or in part whenever the Purchasing Agent determines that termination is in the County's best interest. The County will give the Contractor at least 15 days' notice in writing. The notice must specify the extent to which the Contract is terminated

and the effective termination date. The Contractor will be entitled to termination costs, plus any other reasonable amounts that the parties might negotiate; but no amount will be allowed for anticipatory profits.

Except as otherwise directed by the County, the Contractor must stop work on the date of receipt of the notice of the termination.

This provision applies to any contract greater than \$10,000.

EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY 41 C.F.R. Part 60-1.4(b)

During the performance of this contract, the contractor agrees as follows:

- (1) The contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin. The contractor will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin. Such action shall include, but not be limited to the following:
 - Employment, upgrading, demotion, or transfer; recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.
- (2) The contractor will, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the contractor, state that all qualified applicants will receive considerations for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin.
- (3) The contractor will not discharge or in any other manner discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because such employee or applicant has inquired about, discussed, or disclosed the compensation of the employee or applicant or another employee or applicant. This provision shall not apply to instances in which an employee who has access to the compensation information of other employees or applicants as a part of such employee's essential job functions discloses the compensation of such other employees or applicants to individuals who do not otherwise have access to such information, unless such disclosure is in response to a formal complaint or charge, in furtherance of an investigation, proceeding, hearing, or action, including an investigation conducted by the employer, or is consistent with the contractor's legal duty to furnish information.
- (4) The contractor will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which he has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding, a notice to be provided advising the said labor union or workers' representatives of the contractor's commitments under this section and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.
- (5) The contractor will comply with all provisions of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and

of the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.

- (6) The contractor will furnish all information and reports required by Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and by rules, regulations, and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to his books, records, and accounts by the administering agency and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations, and orders.
- (7) In the event of the contractor's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination clauses of this contract or with any of the said rules, regulations, or orders, this contract may be canceled, terminated, or suspended in whole or in part and the contractor may be declared ineligible for further Government contracts or federally assisted construction contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and such other sanctions as may be imposed and remedies invoked as provided in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, or by rule, regulation, or order of the Secretary of Labor, or as otherwise provided by law.
- (8) The contractor will include the portion of the sentence immediately preceding paragraph (1) and the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (8) in every subcontract or purchase order unless exempted by rules, regulations, or orders of the Secretary of Labor issued pursuant to section 204 of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, so that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor. The contractor will take such action with respect to any subcontract or purchase order as the administering agency may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions, including sanctions for noncompliance:

Provided, however, that in the event a contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such direction by the administering agency the contractor may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.

The applicant further agrees that it will be bound by the above equal opportunity clause with respect to its own employment practices when it participates in federally assisted construction work: Provided, That if the applicant so participating is a State or local government, the above equal opportunity clause is not applicable to any agency, instrumentality or subdivision of such government which does not participate in work on or under the contract. The applicant agrees that it will assist and cooperate actively with the administering agency and the Secretary of Labor in obtaining the compliance of contractors and subcontractors with the equal opportunity clause and the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor, that it will furnish the administering agency and the Secretary of Labor such information as they may require for the supervision of such compliance, and that it will otherwise assist the administering agency in the discharge of the agency's primary responsibility for securing compliance. The applicant further agrees that it will refrain from entering into any contract or contract modification subject to Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, with a contractor debarred from, or who has not demonstrated eligibility for, Government contracts and federally assisted construction contracts pursuant to the Executive Order and will carry out such sanctions and penalties for violation of the equal opportunity clause as may be imposed upon contractors and subcontractors by the administering agency or the Secretary of Labor pursuant to Part II, Subpart D of the Executive Order. In addition, the applicant agrees that if it fails or refuses to comply with these undertakings, the administering agency may take any or all of the following actions: Cancel, terminate, or suspend in whole or in part this grant (contract, loan, insurance, guarantee); refrain from extending any further assistance to the applicant under the program

with respect to which the failure or refund occurred until satisfactory assurance of future compliance has been received from such applicant; and refer the case to the Department of Justice for appropriate legal proceeding

This provision only applies to construction contracts.

CONTRACT WORK HOURS AND SAFETY STANDARDS ACT 40 U.S.C. 3701 29 C.F.R. § 5.5(b)

Compliance with the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act.

- (1) Overtime requirements. No contractor or subcontractor contracting for any part of the contract work which may require or involve the employment of laborers or mechanics shall require or permit any such laborer or mechanic in any workweek in which he or she is employed on such work to work in excess of forty hours in such workweek unless such laborer or mechanic receives compensation at a rate not less than one and one-halftimes the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of forty hours in such workweek.
- (2) <u>Violation; liability for unpaid wages; liquidated damages</u>. In the event of any violation of the clause set forth in paragraph (1) of this section the contractor and any subcontractor responsible therefor shall be liable for the unpaid wages. In addition, such contractor and subcontractor shall be liable to the United States (in the case of work 5 done under contract for the District of Columbia or a territory, to such District or to such territory), for liquidated damages. Such liquidated damages shall be computed with respect to each individual laborer or mechanic, including watchmen and guards, employed in violation of the clause set forth in paragraph (1) of this section, in the sum of \$10 for each calendar day on which such individual was required or permitted to work in excess of the standard workweek of forty hours without payment of the overtime wages required by the clause set forth in paragraph (1) of this section.
- (3) Withholding for unpaid wages and liquidated damages. FEMA or the loan or grant recipient shall upon its own action or upon written request of an authorized representative of the Department of Labor withhold or cause to be withheld, from any moneys payable on account of work performed by the contractor or subcontractor under any such contract or any other Federal contract with the same prime contractor, or any other federally-assisted contract subject to the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act, which is held by the same prime contractor, such sums as may be determined to be necessary to satisfy any liabilities of such contractor or subcontractor for unpaid wages and liquidated damages as provided in the clause set forth in paragraph (2) of this section.
- (4) Subcontracts. The contractor or subcontractor shall insert in any subcontracts the clauses set forth in paragraph (1) through (4) of this section and also a clause requiring the subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts. The prime contractor shall be responsible for compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with the clauses set forth in paragraphs (1) through (4) of this section.

This provision is applicable if the contract sum is over \$100,000 and involves employment of mechanics or laborers.

CLEAN AIR ACT AND THE FEDERAL WATER POLLUTION CONTROL ACT 40 U.S.C.§7401-7671(q) 33 U.S.C.§1251-1387 29 C.F.R. § 5.5(b)

Clean Air Act

- (1) The contractor agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 7401 et seq.
- (2) The contractor agrees to report each violation to Arlington County and understands and agrees that Arlington County will, in tum, report each violation as required to assure notification to the Federal Emergency Management Agency, and the appropriate Environmental Protection Agency Regional Office.
- (3) The contractor agrees to include these requirements in each subcontract exceeding \$150,000 financed in whole or in part with Federal assistance provided by FEMA.

Federal Water Pollution Control Act

- (1) The contractor agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended, 33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.
- (2) The contractor agrees to report each violation to the Arlington County and understands and agrees that Arlington County will, in tum, report each violation as required to assure notification to the Federal Emergency Management Agency, and the appropriate Environmental Protection Agency Regional Office.
- (3) The contractor agrees to include these requirements in each subcontract exceeding \$150,000 financed in whole or in part with Federal assistance provided by FEMA.

This provision applies to any contract greater than \$150,000.

SUSPENSION AND DEBARMENT Executive Order 12549 (1986) Executive Order 12689 (1989) 2 C.F.R. Part 3000

Suspension and Debarment

- (1) This contract is a covered transaction for purposes of 2 C.F.R. pt. 180 and 2 C.F.R. pt. 3000. As such the contractor is required to verify that none of the contractor, its principals (defined at 2 C.F.R. § 180.995), or its affiliates (defined at 2 C.F.R. § 180.905) are excluded (defined at 2 C.F.R. § 180.940) or disqualified (defined at 2 C.F.R. § 180.935).
- (2) The contractor must comply with 2 C.F.R. pt. 180, subpart C and 2 C.F.R. pt. 3000, subpart C and must include a requirement to comply with these regulations in any lower tier covered transaction it enters into.
- (3) This certification is a material representation of fact relied upon by Arlington County. If it is later

determined that the contractor did not comply with 2 C.F.R. pt. 180, subpart C and 2 C.F.R. pt. 3000, subpart C, in addition to remedies available to Arlington County, the Federal Government may pursue available remedies, including but not limited to suspension and/ or debarment.

(4) The contractor agrees to comply with the requirements of 2 C.F.R. pt. 180, subpart C and 2 C.F.R. pt. 3000, subpart C while any offer is valid and throughout the period of any contract that may arise from this offer. The contractor further agrees to include a provision requiring such compliance in its lower tier covered transactions.

The Contractor must complete the certificate entitled *Certification Regarding Debarment, Suspension and Other Responsibility Matters* (Attachment A).

This provision applies to any contract greater than \$25,000.

BYRD ANTI-LOBBING AMENDMENT 31 U.S.C. 1352 45 C.F.R., Part 18, Appendix A

Byrd Anti-Lobbing Amendment

Contractors who apply or bid for an award of \$100,000 or more shall file the certification required by 49 CFR part 20, "New Restrictions on Lobbying." Each tier certifies to the tier above that it will not and has not used Federal appropriated funds to pay any person or organization for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a member of Congress, officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with obtaining any Federal contract, grant or any other award covered by 31 U.S.C. 1352. Each tier shall also disclose the name of any registrant under the Lobbying Disclosure Act of 1995 who has made lobbying contacts on its behalf with non-Federal funds with respect to that Federal contract, grant or award covered by 31 U.S.C. 1352. Such disclosures are forwarded from tier to tier up to the recipient who in turn will forward the certification(s) to the awarding agency.

The certificate entitled *Certification Regarding Lobbying* (Attachment B) must be completed and returned with your bid/proposal.

This provision applies to all contracts. If the contract is greater than \$100,000, the Contractor must submit Attachment B.

PROCUREMENT OF RECOVERED MATERIALS 42 U.S.C. § 6962 Section 6002 of the Solid Waste Disposal Act

In the performance of this contract, the Contractor shall make maximum use of products containing recovered materials that are EPA designated items unless the product cannot be acquired (i) Competitively within a timeframe providing for compliance with the contract performance schedule; (ii) Meeting contract performance requirements; or (iii) At a reasonable price. (2) Information about this requirement is available at EPA's Comprehensive Procurement Guidelines web site, http://www.epa.gov/cpg/. The list of EPA-designate items is available at http://www.epa.gov/cpg/products.htm. (3) The Contractor also agrees to comply with all other applicable

requirements of Section 6002 of the Solid Waste Disposal Act.

This provision is applicable if the contact involves the use of materials (e.g. debris removal or other services).

ADJUSTMENTS FOR CHANGE IN SCOPE

The County may order additions, deletions and other revisions in the Work within the general scope of the project. If the Contractor believes that any change is not within the scope of the project or warrants additional compensation or additional time, the Contractor must notify the Project Officer as soon as the County requests the change; and the Contractor must then provide written notice of its position to the Project Officer within ten calendar days. The Contractor's notice must detail and document the basis for the claimed amount of additional compensation or time. The Contractor will not receive any additional compensation or time pursuant to this paragraph unless the parties execute a written Contract amendment and the County issues a purchase order consistent with the amendment.

This provision is applicable to all contracts.

ACCESS TO RECORDS AND REPORTS DHS Standard Terms and Conditions v.3.0 (2013)

Access to Records - The following access to records requirements apply to this Contract:

- (1) The contractor agrees to provide Arlington County, the FEMA Administrator, the Comptroller General of the United States or any of their authorized representatives access to any books, documents, papers and records of the Contractor which are directly pertinent to this contract for the purposes of making audits, examinations, excerpts and transcriptions.
- (2) The Contractor agrees to permit any of the foregoing parties to reproduce by any means whatsoever or to copy excerpts and transcriptions as reasonably needed.
- (3) The Contractor agrees to provide the FEMA Administrator or his authorized representatives access to construction or other work sites pertaining to the work under the contract.
- 4) In compliance with the Disaster Recovery Act of 2018, Arlington County and the Contractor acknowledge and agree that no language in this contract is intended to prohibit audits or internal reviews by the FEMA Administrator or the Comptroller General of the United States.

This provision is applicable to all contracts.

DHS SEAL, LOGO, AND FLAGS DHS Standard Terms and Conditions v.3.0 (2013)

DHS Seal, Logo, and Flags

The contractor shall not use the DHS seal(s), logos, crests, or reproductions of flags or likenesses of DHS agency officials without specific FEMA pre-approval.

This provision is applicable to all contracts.

COMPLIANCE WITH FEDERAL LAW, REGULATIONS, AND EXECUTIVE ODERS

Upon execution of the contract, the contractor acknowledges that FEMA financial assistance may be used to fund all or a portion of the contract. The contractor will comply with all applicable federal law, regulations, executive orders, policies, procedures, and directives.

This provision is applicable to all contracts.

NO OBLIGATION BY FEDERAL GOVERNMENT
